Your Oral History Interview Checklist

- ◊ Schedule a time in advance. This gives everyone a chance to prepare.
- Practice with your recording device ahead of time. Do a sound check to make sure it's working properly.
- Read the list of interview questions ahead of time. Share them with your relative beforehand so they know what you want to ask them.
- Encourage them to share feelings, stories and descriptions.
- Show interest and make eye contact while they're talking. Smile!
- Use props, when possible. Old photographs, favorite old songs and treasured items may bring memories flooding back.
- Don't push for answers. Your relative may not wish to speak about someone who has passed away or may have other reasons for not wanting to share. Move on to something else.
- Ouse your prepared questions as a guideline, but don't be afraid to let your relative go off on a tangent. They may have many things to say that you never thought to ask!
- Don't interrupt or attempt to correct your relative.
- When you are done, be sure to thank your relative for his/her time.

any of them personally affect your family?

- 10.Describe the personalities of your close family members.

- 14.Is there a naming tradition in your family, such as always giving the firstborn son the name of his paternal grandfather?
